2. According to Jesus in John 6:26, why was the crowd seeking Him? Explain what you think He means.
3. a) In John 6:27, what is Jesus' advice to the crowd regarding work?

b) Name a similar every day substance that also had a spiritual meaning Jesus has used in Chapter 4. Give verses.

c) What do you **think** Jesus is advising His followers about work?

d) How can you balance your work so that your wages are “food that endures to eternal life”?

4. a) **Think** question: In John 6:27(NIV), why is God the Father’s seal of approval important to the Son of Man and what He will give us?

b) List evidence in your life of God’s seal upon you.

5. a) What do the crowds’ requests in John 6:30–31 reveal about their hearts?

b) What do your own repeated requests of God reveal about your heart?

6. John 6:31 refers to manna (Exodus 16:2–5, 31–32) which was said to be a foreshadowing of Jesus. How do you **think** the true bread from heaven differs from manna?
7. a) How does the crowd address Jesus in John 6:25 and 34 (NIV)?
- b) How do you **think** these names reflect the feelings of the crowd in such a short span of time?
- c) What is Jesus' indictment of the crowd in John 6:36?
8. State the several ways Jesus identifies Himself with bread. List verses.
9. a) What are the two things one must do to never go hungry and never be thirsty?
- b) Describe what your answers in (a) mean spiritually.
10. a) What is the Father's will? Give verses.
