Matthew 1: 1-17 - The Unlikely Family Tree of a King September 17. 2017 – Foster City

The Purpose of the Gospel of Matthew: **To Present Jesus the promised Jewish Messiah**, the culmination of God's salvation story, who inaugurates an unlikely kingdom for all.

- 1. What has your own family tree taught you about you and your family?
- 2. What strikes you as compelling about the Book of Matthew or the man, Matthew?
- 3. How are you encouraged to know that Jesus is the fulfillment of God's Promises to both Abraham (Gen 12: 1-13) and King David (2<sup>nd</sup> Samuel 7: 12-13)? How might this change how you think, live and love in your present circumstances?
- 4. What is the most surprising to you when you look at Jesus' Family Tree? Why would Matthew include all the good, the bad and the ugly?
- 5. What does this genealogy reveal about God's grace to you?
- 6. How has God's grace helped you with your own hopes and fears throughout the years?
- 7. Which of these concepts relate to your own life circumstances right now? God's Grace, Your Own Royal Mess Ups, God's Judgment, Exile, Captivity, God Loves Actual People? How?
- 8. How does Jesus the King and Messiah expand his Family Tree? (Grow His Kingdom) What does it mean to receive God's generous invitation of grace?
- 9. How might we encourage each in our community group with these truths from Matthew 1: 1-17?

## South Campus – September 17, 2017

- 1. Why does Matthew include the genealogy of Jesus in his gospel? What is Matthew's aim for his audience?
- 2. In verses 2-6, Matthew lists several non-Jewish figures (Tamar, Rahab, Ruth, and Bathsheba, the wife of Uriah) who were outsiders to the Jewish tribe. Describe a situation in which you felt like an outsider, out of place, in a foreign setting. What were your emotions and thoughts?
- 3. Why is it significant that Matthew includes outsiders (Gentiles) in the genealogy of Jesus?
- 4. In verses 7-11, Matthew lists several kings of Israel's history, including several kings who were considered evil. Why is it significant that Matthew includes sinners in the genealogy of Jesus?
- 5. Share a story from your family history. How does our family history shape who we are?
- 6. The story of Jesus highlights God's grace through history. How have you seen God's grace in your personal story?
