| | b) What does the Bible say about handling conflict? Which one most helps you in a conflict and why? Optional: cite your own favorite Bible passage regarding conflict. 1 Corinthians 6:1-4 |

| 8. | In Genesis 14:1-12 we see the re was much turmoil in the region where Lot settled. How do you think Lot's choices in Chapter 13 might have contributed to him being taken captive, and do you find a caution there for yourself? |
| 9. | What character qualities do you see in Abram's response to Lot's captivity, and how could these have contributed to his victory in V13-16 ? |
| 10 | . From V17-24 compare and contrast the two kings and the way they treated Abram. Did anything catch your attention in these exchanges? |
